Meeting declared open at 9:00am

1. Chairs Welcome

The Chair welcomed members to the meeting.

2. Apologies

Peter Turnell, Director, Recreational and Indigenous Fisheries

3. Confirmation of outcomes from previous RFFTEC meeting

The draft outcomes of the 39th RFFTEC meeting were accepted as a true and accurate record of that meeting. **Moved:** Max Graham **Seconded:** Ron Croker <u>Carried.</u>

4. Action Items from meeting 39

The progress of action items from the previous meeting was noted.

5. Correspondence received

a. Letter from Matthew Hansen seeking additional freshwater fisheries compliance in the Dubbo region

b. Letters from Mr Izzard, Mr Delaney and Mr Simshauser regarding the Basscatch program.

NSW DPI advised that Fisheries Officers are regionally located across inland NSW at a number of sites to maximise operating efficiency of the Officers and to achieve maximum compliance with fishing rules/ DPI also advised that there are no current plans to vary the bass catch program at this stage and that funding for these programs has been allocated for 2012/13 as part of the Trust Investment Plan.

6. NSW Recreational Fishing Trust Report

The status of the Freshwater Trust was provided at the meeting. Annual and meeting reports for Trust funded programs were submitted by project managers to enable committee members to review progress of projects prior to the meeting.

A community expression of interest for Trust funded programs was advertised by the Department and widely circulated using a media release, mail outs to fishing clubs, councils, the Department's website and other networks. The Department received many

enquiries from the community about funding opportunities and assistance was provided to develop applications. A large number of applications were received by the Department.

Recreational fishing licence fees

As previously supported by RFFTEC and ACoRF, it is proposed to increase the recreational fishing fee in line with CPI next financial year. Potential removal of the 3 day licence will still be considered but will require amendments to the *Fisheries Management Act 1994*.

Development of the Trust Investment Plan beyond 2012/13

The Department provided an update on planning for the Recreational Fishing Trust Investment Plan beyond 2012/13 noting that the current 5 year Investment Plan finishes 30 June 2013.

The Committee acknowledged that the current Plan has been working well allowing for long term planning of ongoing programs as well as catering for new tactical programs, which have been included in the Plan over time.

Prior to development of last Plan, DPI undertook a Trust survey of licence holders by an independent consultant on how funds from the NSW recreational fishing licence should be spent. It has been proposed to run another similar survey in the next 3 months.

Given some large programs have been operating for some time as part of the current Plan, Expenditure Committees have previously suggested that an appraisal of current programs is required prior to development of any new Plan. It is proposed to hold two day expenditure committee meetings in August to appraise existing programs (many of which are jointly funded by the Saltwater and Freshwater Trusts) and identify any new directions or new priorities.

7. Appraisal of Investment Plan for 2012/13 Programs

The Recreational Fishing Trust Investment Plan previously supported for funding by the Expenditure Committees and ACoRF and approved by the Minister, was presented to RFFTEC. Annual and meeting reports submitted by program managers had also been prepared for the Committees information and review (refer to Tables 1 and 2). RFFTEC reiterated support for the previously approved programs in the Investment Plan.

8. Review of new 2012/13 FW and Joint funding applications

New Trust project applications (large and small grants) supported for funding by the Freshwater Trust are listed in Table 3. New Trust project applications deferred for further consideration are listed in Table 4. New project applications not supported for funding by the Freshwater Trust are listed in Table 5.

9. 2012/13 Investment Plan summary

The revised financial status of the Freshwater Trust was noted taking account of projects supported for funding at the meeting and remaining contingency funds of the Freshwater Trust. The Trust Investment Plan for 2012/13 will be updated with new projects supported by the expenditure committee at the meeting, following support from ACoRF and funding approval by the Minister.

10. General Business

<u>2012 National Recreational Fishing Conference</u> - Travel and accommodation expenses will be provided to two RFFTEC delegates planning to attend the upcoming National

Recreational Fishing Conference, to be held at the Gold Coast Convention and Exhibition Centre on 17-19 August 2012. The purpose of the conference is to provide an international perspective on the future of recreational fishing. Delegates will have the opportunity to visit a range of presentations from keynote speakers from across Australia and to establish business relationships with supporting organisations. Nominated representatives will need to provide a report on the outcomes of the conference at the next expenditure committee meeting. Mr Max Graham and Mr Tom Williams were nominated as RFFTEC representatives to attend the National Recreational Fishing Conference.

<u>Future catfish re-introductions</u> - Mr Richard Ping Kee requested an update on the feasibility of translocating catfish from Copeton Dam into the lower Gwydir River. NSW DPI advised that Dr Meaghan Rourke is completing a study into the habitat requirements for freshwater catfish. A report on areas suitable for catfish re-introductions is being prepared, which will include a review of environmental factors to permit future catfish restocking/translocation, subject to adherence with population genetic guidelines for breeding of the species.

<u>Recreational Fishing Guides</u> – Mr Tom Williams asked if consideration could be given to the production of one combined fresh / salt recreational fishing guide in the future, given that there is some overlap in information content between the saltwater and freshwater guides. NSW DPI advised it would consider the issue during future annual revisions.

Action item: NSW DPI to consider producing a combined recreational fishing guide in the future.

11. Project updates - presentations

<u>Murray Cod Fishery Management Group</u> - Mr Matt Barwick discussed the formation of the Murray Cod Fishery Management Group (MCFMG) which has been set up to align and improve research and management of Murray cod across multiple jurisdictions. An Action Plan has been developed to identify and quantify environmental parameters that drive recruitment and population growth in Murray cod, to quantify the Murray cod recreational fishery and to enhance the sustainability of Murray cod populations across the MDB in the longer term. The MCFMG is keen to work collaboratively with NSW DPI and the Freshwater Trust to address these issues.

<u>Recfishing Research</u> - Mr Bill Sawynok discussed the challenges facing recreational fishing at a national scale, which includes a greater understanding of the social and economics benefits of recreational fishing; improving engagement with government and organisations that can impact on fishing; improving fishing opportunities and sustainability of resources and improving resilience of recreational fishers facing environmental, climate and social change. A business plan has been developed to identify funding priorities and to guide / assist research and development in addressing these challenges. It was noted that Recfishing Research would work in conjunction with the MCFMG, NSW DPI and other relevant organisations to develop a funding proposal on the biology and recruitment of Murray cod within the MDB, for consideration by the FRDC during its next funding round.

<u>Survival of fish caught and released</u> - Dr Matt Broadhurst updated the Committee on the outcomes of research into post release survival of fish and practices that improve the survival of released fish in freshwater. A comprehensive NSW Catch-and-Release Fishing Guide is being produced which will summarise best-practises for maximising post-release survival such as landing and handling catch, releasing catch and minimising deep hooking,

air exposure and the impacts of barotrauma. Specific information will also be provided to highlight best practice catch and releases methods for different species.
